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§1380.3. Definitions. 1 2 3 For the purpose of the regulations contained in this chapter, the term "Board" means the Board of Psychology, and the term "Code" means the Business and Professions Code, 4 5 and the term "trainee" means a psychology trainee working under one of the conditions in section 1387. 6 7 §1381. Applications. 8 9 All applications shall be accompanied by such evidence, statements or documents as 10 required to establish that the applicant meets all of the requirements for licensing or 11 registration as set forth in the Code. 12 § 1381.1. Abandonment of Applications. 13 14 An application shall be withdrawn without prejudice when, in the discretion of the Board. 15 an applicant does not exercise due diligence in the completion of his or her application, 16 in furnishing additional information or documents requested or in the payment of any 17 required fees. An applicant who subsequently decides to reapply shall be required to file 18 19 a new application and pay the current application fee. 20 §1381.2. Petition for ReviewHearing of Educational Credentials. 21 22 An applicant for examination or licensure whose educational credentials indicate 23 ineligibility for licensure shall be so notified of the deficiency. The applicant may provide 24 additional information or documentation correct the any deficiency indicated and/or, in 25 the alternative, file a request for hearing a review before by the Boardappropriate 26 committee. 27 28 §1381.4. Failure to Appear for Examination—Withdrawal of Application. 29 30 Any applicant approved to take or retake a Board licensing examination who fails to 31 appear for such examination in any twelve month period shall have his or her 32 application withdrawn. An applicant who subsequently decides to take the examination 33 shall be required to file a new application and pay the current application and 34 examination fees. 35 36 37 §1381.5. Failure to Pay Initial License Fee. 38 An application shall be deemed abandoned if an applicant fails to pay the initial license 39 40 fee within three two years after notification by the Board. An applicant whose application has been deemed abandoned may again be eligible for licensure upon the filing of a 41 new application and meeting all current licensing requirements, including payment of 42 any fees. Such applicant shall not be required to take the Examination for Professional 43 Practice in Psychology (EPPP) but shall take and pass the California Psychology Laws 44

45 and Ethics Examination (CPLEE).

§ 1382. Human Sexuality Training.

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2 3 Unless otherwise exempted, all persons applying for a license as a psychologist shall, in addition to all other requirements for licensure, have completed coursework or training 4 in human sexuality which meets the requirements of this section. Such training shall: 5 (a) Be completed after January 1, 1970. 6 7 (b) Be obtained (1) In an accredited or approved educational institution, as defined in section 8 2901 of the Code, including extension courses offered by such institutions, or 9 (2) In an educational institution approved by the Department of Education 10 pursuant to section 94310 of the Education Code, or 11 (3) From a continuing education provider approved by a professional association, or 12 (4) In a course sponsored or offered by a professional association, or 13 (5) In a course sponsored, offered or approved by a local, county or state 14 department of health or mental health or by health agencies of the Federal 15 Government. 16 (c) Have a minimum length of ten (10) contact hours. 17 (d) Include the study of physiological-psychological and social-cultural variables 18 associated with sexual identity, sexual behavior or sexual disorders. All applicants shall 19 20 provide the board with documentation of completion of the required human sexuality 21 training. It is the intent of the board that all persons licensed to practice psychology have minimal training in human sexuality. It is not intended that by complying with the 22 requirements of this section only, a practitioner is fully trained in the subject of sex 23 24 therapy. 25 § 1382.3. Training in Alcoholism/Chemical Dependency Detection and Treatment. 26 27 The requirements set forth in Section 2914 (e) of the code shall be satisfied by 28 completion of a graduate level course which meets the following criteria: 29 (a) The course shall be devoted solely to the topic of alcoholism and chemical 30 dependency detection and treatment and shall not be less than a; semester or a quarter 31 32 term in length. (b) The course must be obtained at an educational institution, or in an extension course 33 offered by an institution, which is either credited under Education Code Section 34 94310.1. or approved under Education Code Section 94310.2, by the State Department 35 of Education. 36 (c) An original transcript indicating successful completion of the course shall be deemed 37 sufficient evidence for purposes of satisfying this requirement. 38 (d) The course shall include training in each of the following subjects as they relate to 39 alcoholism and chemical dependency: 40

- (1) The definition of alcoholism and other chemical dependency, and the evaluationof the user.
- 43 (2) Current theories of, and research on, the etiology of substance abuse.
- 44 (3) Physiological and medical aspects and effects of alcoholism and other chemical45 dependency.

(4) Psychopharmacology and the interaction of various classes of drugs, including
 alcohol.

3 (5) Diagnosing and differentiating alcoholism and substance abuse in patients

- referred for' other clinical symptoms, such as depression, anxiety, psychosis, and
 impotence.
- 6 (6) Populations at risk with regard to substance abuse.
- 7 (7) Cultural and ethnic considerations.
- 8 (8) Prenatal effects.
- 9 (9) Adolescent substance abuse.
- 10 (10) Implications for the geriatric population.
- 11 (11) latrogenic dependency.
- (12) Major treatment approaches to alcoholism and chemical dependency, includingresearch and application.
- 14 (13) The role of persons and systems which support or compound abuse.
- 15 (14) Family issues which include treatment approaches with families of alcoholics
- 16 and/or substance abusers.
- 17 (15) The process of referring affected persons.
- (16) Community resources offering assessment, treatment and follow up for theabuser and family.
- 20 (17) Ethical and Legal issues for clinical practice.
 - (18) Prevention of substance abuse.

23 § 1382.4. Child Abuse Assessment Training Requirements.

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All persons applying for a license or renewal of a license as a psychologist shall in 25 addition to all other requirements for licensure, have completed coursework or training 26 in child abuse assessment and reporting and shall submit documentation thereof to the 27 28 board. The coursework or training in child abuse assessment and reporting shall consist of not less than 7 instructional hours and shall include training in each of the subject 29 areas described in section 28 of the Code. The coursework or training shall be: 30 (a) Obtained at an educational institution, or in an extension course offered by an 31 institution which is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, the 32 Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, or an essentially equivalent 33 accrediting agency as determined by the board or approved by the State Department of 34 Education pursuant to section 94310.2 of the Education Code; or 35

36 (b) Obtained from a statewide professional association representing the professions of

37 psychology, social work, or marriage, family and child counseling; or

(c) Obtained from or sponsored by a local county, state or federal governmental entity.
 (d) Completed after January 1, 1983.

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- § 1382.5. Spousal or Partner Abuse Assessment, Detection, and Intervention
 Strategies Training Requirements.
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All persons applying for a license as a psychologist who began their graduate training
 on or after January 1, 1995 shall, in addition to all other requirements for licensure, have
 completed coursework in spousal or partner abuse assessment, detection, and

1 intervention strategies and shall submit documentation thereof to the board. The

2 coursework in spousal or partner abuse assessment, detection, and intervention

3 strategies shall consist of not less than a combined total of two (2) hours focused on this

4 topic. All persons applying for a license as a psychologist who began their graduate

5 training on or after January 1, 2004 shall also meet the above requirement, however,

6 such course shall consist of at least fifteen (15) contact hours.

7 The coursework shall be:

8 (a) taken in fulfillment of other educational requirements in the applicant's graduate

9 and/or doctoral training, or

10 (b) taken in a separate course approved by the board's recognized continuing education 11 accrediting agency, or

12 (c) taken in a separate course provided by a sponsor approved by the American

13 Psychological Association.

14 (d) completed after January 1, 1995.

15 An applicant may request an exemption from this requirement if he or she intends to

16 practice in an area that does not include the direct provision of mental health services.

17 18 § 1382.6. Aging and Long-Term Care Training Requirements.

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All persons applying for a license as a psychologist who began their graduade training on or after January 1, 2004, shall, in addition to all other requirements for licensure.

22 have completed coursework in aging and long-term care which shall include but not be

23 limited to the biological, social, and psychological aspects of aging, and shall submit

24 documentation thereof of the board. The coursework in aging and long-term care shall

consist of not less than a combined total of ten (10) contact hours focused on this topic.

28 and/or doctoral training, or

(b) taken in a separate course approved by the board's recognized continuing education

35 § 1386. Revised Criteria for Evaluation of Education.

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37 (a) Only those doctorate degrees which are designated as being earned in a

department or school of psychology, educational psychology or education with the field

of specialization in counseling psychology or educational psychology shall be accepted

40 as an earned doctorate degree as specified in section 2914, subdivisions (b)(1) through

41 (3), of the code. If it is not evident on the official transcript, the board may require that

42 any doctorate degree earned in education with the field of specialization in counseling

43 psychology or educational psychology be certified by the registrar as such a degree.

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1 § 1387. Supervised Professional Experience (SPE).

2 This section applies to all trainees, pre- or post-doctoral, who intend to accruing accrue

3 for hours of supervised professional experience (SPE) to count toward meeting the

4 licensing requirements stated in section 2914(c) of the Business and Professions Code.

5 Those <u>All</u> trainees accruing hours of <u>SPE</u> supervised experience in areas of general

6 applied psychology that do not include direct mental health services must also should

7 refer to section 1387 subdivision (e) -3 for information on establishing an alternate plan

8 for SPE.

9 (a) SPE is defined as an organized program that consists of a planned, structured and

10 administered sequence of professionally supervised comprehensive clinical applied

11 training experiences. SPE shall have a logical training sequence that builds upon the

12 skills and competencies of trainees to prepare them for the independent practice of

13 psychology once they become licensed. SPE shall include:

14 (1) socialization into the profession of psychology and shall be augmented by integrated

15 modalities including mentoring, didactic exposure, role-modeling, enactment,

16 observational/vicarious learning, and consultative guidance.

17 SPE shall include (2) activities which that address the integration of psychological

18 concepts and current and evolving competencies, scientific knowledge, principles, and

19 theories to the professional delivery of psychological services to the consumer-public.

20 SPE shall include (3) only the time spent by the trainee engaged in psychological

21 activities that directly serve to prepare the trainee for the independent practice of

22 psychology once licensed. SPE shall not include custodial tasks such as filing,

23 transcribing or other clerical duties.

The term "trainee" as used in these regulations means a psychology trainee working under one of the conditions listed in subsections (ab)(1) and (ab)(2) of this section.

(ab) Pursuant to section 2914(c) of the Code, two years of qualifying SPE shall be
completed and documented prior to licensure. One year of SPE shall be defined as
1500 hours. At least one year of SPE shall be completed post-doctorally. Each year of
SPE shall be completed within a thirty (30) consecutive months period. If both years of
SPE (3000 hours) are completed post_doctorally, they shall be completed within a sixty
(60) consecutive months period. Upon showing of good cause as determined by the
Board, these specified time limitations may be reasonably modified.

(1) Pre-doctoral SPE: Up to 1500 hours of SPE may be accrued pre-doctorally but only
 after completion of 48 semester/trimester or 72 quarter units of graduate coursework in
